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**T**he George Washington University (GW) is one of the nation's outstanding universities. Recently, the University celebrated the 185th anniversary of its chartering by the United States Congress. The Foggy Bottom Campus is located in north-west Washington, just five blocks from the White House and five blocks from the Department of State. It is just a subway ride away from the Capitol, the Library of Congress, the Supreme Court, the National Institute of Health, and the museums of the Smithsonian Institution. The Mount Vernon Campus is in a quiet, residential neighborhood of stately homes and embassies known as Foxhall. The University enjoys a student, faculty, and staff population of nearly 30,000 individuals, plus a significant number of visitors to GW's many programs and special events.

The University's campuses are located in the safest areas of the city, but no campus is free from crime, whether it is urban, suburban, or rural. All members of the University community, therefore, should take reasonable precautions. GW is committed to working with all members of the community to make our campuses safe and secure environments. The University has developed a series of policies and procedures to assist in these efforts.

The following information has been prepared to increase your awareness of the current programs that exist to assist you in protecting your safety and well-being. Portions are also provided in compliance with federal law, specifically the Clery Act and the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA). GW has been fortunate in experiencing few serious crimes, but such incidents could occur, and all crime is serious to the victim. Students, faculty, and staff are responsible for adopting measures to protect themselves and their possessions.

The information contained on pages 1 through 67 of this brochure pertains to the Foggy Bottom Campus and the Mount Vernon Campus. Since students regularly use both campuses, the compliance information for both campuses has been combined into one section of this document so that all GW students receive security information and crime statistics for both campuses.

The information contained on pages 68 through 71 of this brochure pertains to the Loudoun County campus located in Northern Virginia. This information is in a separate section of the document because the security procedures are significantly different from those at the DC campuses.

## The University's Security Departments

The GW Police Department (GWPD) is responsible for providing police and security services for the Foggy Bottom and Mount Vernon campuses. On the Foggy Bottom Campus, GWPD is located at 2033 G Street, NW, in Woodhull House. On the Mount Vernon Campus, GWPD is located in the Gatehouse at the W Street entrance to campus. GWPD is headed by a Chief who reports to the Associate Vice President for Security and Safety. There are more than 100 uniformed personnel, all of whom are Special Police Officers commissioned by, or security officers licensed by the DC government. GW police officers have the authority to make arrests on GW-owned, -leased, or -controlled property. There are also 35 other staff members who work at Woodhull House. GWPD officers cover the Foggy Bottom Campus by foot, bicycle, and vehicle patrols, as well as by staffing several fixed posts. GWPD officers cover the Mount Vernon Campus by foot, bicycle, and vehicle patrols, as well as staffing the Gatehouse. GWPD also hires students to work as Community Service Aides in specific residence halls and academic buildings on the Foggy Bottom Campus. These students are responsible for checking IDs and providing additional “eyes and ears” for the Department. Hospital Security, which is responsible for the Hospital, is headed by a Director who reports to the senior assistant administrator of the Hospital. Hospital Security is located on the first floor of the Hospital and employs Special Police Officers to patrol on foot and provide access control for the Hospital. Both departments provide around-the-clock patrols and other services to the University community. They enforce federal and local statutes as well as GW regulations. Officers are on duty 24-hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year.

## Working Relationships with Other Law Enforcement Agencies

The GW Police Department maintains a close working relationship with the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD). The GWPD staff occasionally works with other law enforcement agencies in DC, including the FBI, Metro Transit Police, the Park Police and the U.S. Secret Service. Meetings are held between the leaders of these agencies on both a formal and informal basis. The officers of GWPD and MPD communicate regularly on the scene of incidents that occur in and around the campus area. The GW Police Investigators work closely with the investigative staff at MPD when incidents arise that require joint investigative efforts, resources, crime related reports and exchanges of information, as deemed necessary. There is no written memorandum of understanding between GWPD and MPD.

## Training

Unlike many other college and university police departments, GWPD employs a training coordinator who is responsible for conducting intensive and on-going training for all campus police and security officers. Training subjects include criminal law, civil law, public relations, race relations, interpersonal communication, crisis intervention, critical incident response, and all facets of protection of persons and property. Training includes guest lecturers from the Metropolitan Police Department and other outside agencies, such as the FBI and the Secret Service. Training is also conducted during daily roll call sessions. This training usually includes updates on existing problems, new court decisions impacting the University environment, and other timely topics. The police officers also attend a 251-hour Campus Public Safety Institute sponsored by the Consortium of Universities of the Washington Metropolitan Area. In addition, all GWPD police and security personnel are certified in standard first aid and CPR.

## Reporting Procedures

### General Procedures for Reporting a Crime or Emergency

Community members, students, faculty, staff, and guests are encouraged to report all crimes and public safety-related incidents to GWPD in a timely manner. This publication focuses on GWPD because it patrols the majority of the Foggy Bottom Campus and the Mount Vernon Campus. However, Hospital Security should be contacted when incidents, emergencies, or crimes occur in the Hospital.

To report a crime or an emergency on the Foggy Bottom Campus, call GWPD at extension 4-6111 or, from outside the University phone system, (202) 994-6111. To report a non-emergency security or public safety-related matter, call GWPD at extension 4-6110 or, from outside the University phone system, (202) 994-6110.

To report a crime or emergency on the Mount Vernon Campus, call GWPD at 2-6111 or, from outside the University phone system, (202) 242-6111. To report a non-emergency security or public safety-related matter, call GWPD at 2-6110 or, from outside the phone system, (202) 242-6110.

If a crime or emergency occurs in the Hospital, call Hospital Security at (202) 715-5000.

Dispatchers are available at these respective telephone numbers 24-hours a day to answer your calls. In response to a call, GWPD or Hospital Security will take the required action, either by dispatching

an officer or asking the victim to report to GWPDP to file an incident report. All GWPDP incident reports are forwarded to the Dean of Students Office for review and referral to the Office of Student Judicial Services for potential action, as appropriate. GWPDP Investigators will investigate a report when it is deemed appropriate.

Additional information obtained via the investigation will also be forwarded to the Office of Student Judicial Services. If assistance is required from the Metropolitan Police Department or the District of Columbia Fire Department, GWPDP will contact the appropriate unit. If a sexual assault or rape should occur, staff on the scene, including GWPDP, will offer the victim a wide variety of services. GWPDP employs a Coordinator of Victim Services and Educational Initiatives who is available to answer questions and assist victims in identifying and obtaining the necessary resources. GW also has a Sexual Assault Crisis Consultation Team that has trained members who are on-call and available to assist a victim of sexual assault 24-hours a day.

This publication contains information about on- and off-campus resources and is made available to all GW community members. The information about “resources” is not provided to infer that those resources are “crime reporting entities” for GW. Crimes should be reported to the GW Police Department to ensure inclusion in the annual crime statistics and to aid in providing timely warning notices to the community, when appropriate. For example, a crime that was reported only to the DC Rape Crisis Center would not be included in the GW crime statistics.

GWPDP sends a request each year to the University Counseling Center that encourages the counselors to inform the persons they are counseling of the procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics, when they deem it appropriate.

#### **Notification to the GW Community about Reported Crimes**

In an effort to provide timely notice to the GW community, and in the event of a serious incident which may pose an on-going threat to members of the GW community, a blast email Crime Alert is sent to all students and employees on campus. **The alerts are generally written by the Chief of Police or a designee and they are approved and distributed to the community by External Relations.** Updates to the GW community about any particular case resulting in a Crime Alert may be distributed via blast email, may be posted on the Campus Advisories website or may be shared with *The GW Hatchet* for a follow-up story. Crime Alert posters may also be posted by GWPDP in campus buildings when deemed nec-

essary. When crime alerts are posted in campus buildings, they are printed on orange paper and posted in the lobby/entrance area of the affected building(s) for seven days.

Crime Alerts are usually distributed for the following Uniformed Crime Reporting Program (UCR)/National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) classifications: arson, criminal homicide, and robbery. Cases of aggravated assault and sex offenses are considered on a case-by-case basis, depending on the facts of the case and the information known by GWPDP. For example, if an assault occurs between two students who have a disagreement, there may be no on-going threat to other GW community members and a Crime Alert would not be distributed. The GW Police Chief or designee reviews all reports to determine if there is an on-going threat to the community and if the distribution of a Crime Alert is warranted. Crime Alerts may also be posted for other crime classifications, as deemed necessary.

Representatives from *The GW Hatchet*, a student newspaper, the *Daily Colonial*, an online news organization, and *WRGW*, the campus radio station, are invited to meet with the GWPDP Chief of Police or a designee on a weekly basis to discuss crime on campus, and they decide what information they want to report to the University community.

A daily crime log is available for review 24-hours a day on the GWPDP website at <http://gwired.gwu.edu/upd> or at the GWPDP at Woodhull House, in room 102, from 8 a.m.–5 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. The information in the crime log typically includes the case number, classification, date reported, date occurred, time occurred, general location, and disposition of each crime.

#### **Statistical Disclosure of Reported Incidents**

Incidents reported to GWPDP that fall into one of the required reporting classifications will be disclosed as a statistic in this annual brochure published by GWPDP.

#### **Reporting Methods Available on Campus**

GWPDP can be contacted from on-campus telephones by dialing a 5 digit extension. For an emergency at Foggy Bottom, dial 4-6111 and for a non-emergency, dial 4-6110. For an emergency at Mount Vernon, dial 2-6111 and for a non-emergency, dial 2-6110. Free on campus telephones are located in the lobbies and corridors of many campus buildings.

In addition, approximately 39 emergency phones at Foggy Bottom and 4 at Mount Vernon automatically ring in the GWPDP dispatch area.

**Foggy Bottom Campus only:** The University Parking Garage, Marvin Center Garage, Funger Hall Garage, Ross Hall Garage, the Medical Faculty Associates Garage, Academic Center Garage, Duquès Hall Garage, HOVA Garage, Media and Public Affairs Building Garage, 1957/1959 E Street Garage, Lerner Health & Wellness Center Garage, Dakota Garage, City Hall Garage, Amsterdam Hall Garage, Ivory Tower Garage, South Hall (2135 F Street) Garage, and Aston Garage are equipped with “panic” buttons that, when pushed, send an alarm signal directly to GWPD. Members of the community, as they go about their daily schedules, should familiarize themselves with these instruments and their locations.

#### **Reporting a Crime to the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD)**

A person reporting a crime to GWPD has the right to report the crime to the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD). GWPD officers regularly discuss this option with the victim of a crime and will assist the victim with that process.

#### **Off-Campus Crime**

If MPD is contacted about criminal activity occurring off-campus involving GW students, MPD may notify GWPD. However, there is no official MPD policy requiring such notification. Students in these cases may be subject to arrest by MPD and university judicial proceedings through the Office of Student Judicial Services.

#### **Confidential Reporting Procedures**

If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the University system or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, a GWPD officer can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the University can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, employees and visitors; determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant; and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the institution.

#### **The MPD Response to Student Organizations**

GW does not have any officially recognized student organizations that have housing facilities “off-campus.” There are several recognized student organizations that occupy privately owned houses within the campus boundaries. If MPD is called by a citizen to respond to

one of those locations, MPD will typically notify GWPD to respond with them or they will notify GWPD after they have responded to inform GWPD of the situation. However, MPD does this out of courtesy and is not “required” to notify or involve GWPD when they respond to a call involving private property.

#### **TIPS Line**

GWPD operates a “TIPS” line to allow people to anonymously report security and safety related concerns and to provide GWPD with “tips” about criminal incidents or behavior on campus. Call (202) 994-TIPS (8477) to reach this recorded line. The TIPS line is monitored by the GW Chief of Police. Additionally, tips can be filed at GWPD’s website via our online TIPS form at <http://gwired.gwu.edu/upd>.

### **Access to Campus Facilities at Mount Vernon**

The Mount Vernon Campus is open to the public, even though most of the property is surrounded by a fence. The W Street and the Whitehaven entrances are accessible 24-hours a day and should be used in accordance with the policies established by the Mount Vernon Campus administration. The W Street entrance is typically staffed by GWPD personnel. The Academic Building, Ames, Acheson Science Center, the Hand Chapel and the Lloyd Gymnasium are typically secured during the evening hours. The schedules for these buildings fluctuate and are available from the Operations Office. The Library hours fluctuate throughout the year, so it is best to check the Library schedule to determine the operating hours. The Library’s 24-hour Computer Lab is located in the front foyer of the Library. While the students have access to the lab at all times, the remainder of the Library is not accessible after the posted business hours. The residence halls are restricted to residents, their approved guests, and other approved members of the University community. Each resident has a front door key or a GWorld card which allows access to the residence hall in which they live. Guests of residents must be accompanied at all times by the resident whom they are visiting.

### **Access to Campus Facilities at Foggy Bottom**

#### **Academic and Administrative Buildings**

The Foggy Bottom Campus is part of the city of Washington and, as such, is open to the public. The academic and administrative buildings are open to the public, at a minimum, during normal business hours. Most facilities have individual hours, and the hours may vary at different times of the year. Access to some of these buildings is also controlled by card access after normal business hours, and all of these buildings have varied levels of access.

Most academic and administrative buildings do not have a GWPD officer assigned to them. However, GWPD officers patrol the academic and administrative buildings on a regular basis. For information about the access protocol for a specific building, see the building manager, a department head, or contact GWPD at (202) 994-6110.

### **Residence Halls**

Access to residence halls is restricted to residents, their approved guests, and other approved members of the University community. Residents gain entry by swiping their cards in the card access readers. Residents are cautioned against permitting strangers to enter the buildings and are urged to require individuals seeking entry to use their access cards. GWPD officers patrol the residence halls on a regular basis.

House Staff and Community Directors also enforce security measures in the halls and work with residents to achieve a community respectful of individual and group rights and responsibilities. House Staff and GWPD staff also conduct periodic educational sessions on prevention of various crimes, including sexual assault and acquaintance rape.

## **Maintenance of Campus Facilities**

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. GWPD regularly patrols both campuses and reports malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to Facilities Management for correction. Other members of the University community are helpful when they report equipment problems to GWPD or to Facilities Management.

## **Crime Statistics**

**The information below provides context for the crime statistics reported as part of compliance with the Clery Act.**

The procedures for preparing the annual disclosure of crime statistics include reporting statistics to the University community obtained from the following sources: the GW Police Department (GWPD), the DC Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), the GW Hospital Security Department, and non-police officials (as defined below). For statistical purposes, crime statistics reported to any of these sources are recorded in the calendar year the crime was reported.

A written request for statistical information is made on an annual basis to all Campus Security Authorities (as defined by federal law) and to all University Deans, Directors, and Department Heads. Statistical information is requested and provided to GWPD by the employees at the University Counseling Center and the Student

Health Center, even though they are not required by law to provide statistics for the compliance document. Members of the Sexual Assault Crisis Consultation (SACC) Team also provide statistics to GWPD about cases they have dealt with where the victim chose not to report the incident to GWPD or MPD.

All of the statistics are gathered, compiled, and reported to the University community via this brochure, entitled “Pride in Protection & Service” (referred to as the “Pride” brochure), which is published by GWPD. GWPD submits the annual crime statistics published in this brochure to the Department of Education (ED). The statistical information gathered by the Department of Education is available to the public through the ED website.

GWPD sends a postcard to every enrolled student and current employee on an annual basis. The postcard includes a brief summary of the contents of the “Pride” brochure. The postcard also includes the address for the GWPD website where the “Pride” brochure can be found on-line (<http://gwired.gwu.edu/upd/compliance>) and information about how to request a hard copy of the brochure.

### **Specific Information about Classifying Crime Statistics**

The statistics in this brochure are published in accordance with the standards and guidelines used by the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook and the relevant federal law (the Clery Act).

The number of victims involved in a particular incident is indicated in the statistics column for the following crime classifications: Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter, Negligent Manslaughter, Forcible and Non-Forcible Sex Offenses, and Aggravated Assault. For example, if an aggravated assault occurs and there are three victims, this would be counted as three aggravated assaults in the crime statistics chart.

The number reflected in the statistics for the following crime categories includes one offense per distinct operation: Robbery, Burglary, Larceny, Vandalism, and Arson. For example, if five students are walking across campus together and they are robbed, this would count as one instance of robbery in the crime statistics chart.

In cases of Motor Vehicle Theft, each vehicle stolen is counted as a statistic.

In cases involving Liquor Law, Drug Law, and Illegal Weapons violations, each person who was arrested is indicated in the arrest statistics.

The statistics captured under the “Referred for Disciplinary Action” section for Liquor Law, Drug Law, and Illegal Weapons violations indicates the number of people the Dean of Students representative referred to the Office of Student Judicial Services for disciplinary

action for violations of those specific laws. Being “found responsible” for a violation includes a referral that resulted in a student being charged by Student Judicial Services and a record of the action being kept on file.

The statistics in the Hate Crime charts are separated by category of prejudice. The numbers for most of the specific crime categories are part of the overall statistics reported for each year. The only exceptions to this are the addition of Simple Assault, Intimidation, and any other crime that involves bodily injury that is not already included in the required reporting categories. If a hate crime occurs where there is an incident involving Intimidation, Vandalism, Larceny, Simple Assault or other bodily injury, the law requires that the statistic be reported as a hate crime even though there is no requirement to report the crime classification in any other area of the compliance document. Note: A hate or bias related crime is not a separate, distinct crime, but is the commission of a criminal offense which was motivated by the offender’s bias. For example, a subject assaults a victim, which is a crime. If the facts of the case indicate that the offender was motivated to commit the offense because of his/her bias against the victim’s race, sexual orientation, etc., the assault is then also classified as a hate/bias crime.

#### **Specific Information about the Crime Statistics Reported by GW**

The column “Reported to GWPD” includes crime statistics from incidents that were reported to GWPD. If an incident was reported to both GWPD and MPD, the statistics would be counted under the “Reported to GWPD” column. Incidents reported to the GW Hospital Security Department are also included in this column.

The column “Reported to MPD” includes crime statistics from incidents that were reported to MPD but NOT reported to GWPD. These incidents could have occurred on/in on-campus property, non-campus property or public property, as defined in the Appendix. The crime statistics provided by MPD are provided based on the crime definitions in the DC Crimes Code, not based on the Uniformed Crime Reporting Program (UCR)/National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS), as required by the federal law.

The column “Reported to Non-Police” includes crime statistics from incidents reported to Sexual Assault Crisis Consultation (SACC) Team members or from officials at the institution who are defined by federal law as Campus Security Authorities because they have significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, Housing Staff, Community Directors, and Student Judicial Services staff.

Statistics for “Residential Facilities” are also counted in the “On-Campus” crime category. The law requires institutions to break out the number of “On-Campus” crimes that occur in residential facilities. Crime statistics for the categories of larceny and vandalism are not required by law, but are still provided in the interest of informing the community about the most frequent crimes that occur at GW. Only those incidents reported to GWPD are captured in these statistics. GWPD does not request these statistics from MPD or other Campus Security Authorities.

Statistics under the heading of “Referred for Disciplinary Action” include those individuals referred to the Office of Student Judicial Services (SJS) for disciplinary action by the Dean of Students Office. The numbers include incidents that are reported via GWPD incident reports and reports provided directly to SJS from other members of the GW community. Referrals include the number of people referred for disciplinary action by SJS and found responsible for violating those specific laws. Being “found responsible” is defined above.

The crime statistics for residence halls that are located outside the campus boundaries but are reasonably contiguous to the campus (HOVA and the Aston) are captured in the “On-Campus” category.

## **Sex Offender Registry**

The federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, enacted on October 28, 2000, requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement agency information provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice, as required under State law, of each institution of higher education in that State at which the person is employed, carries on a vocation, volunteers services or is a student.

In DC, convicted sex offenders must register with the Metropolitan Police Department. You can link to this information, which appears on MPD’s website, by accessing GWPD’s website at [gwired.gwu.edu/upd](http://gwired.gwu.edu/upd).

## **Emergency Response**

The University’s Incident Manual includes information about Incident Teams; University operating status parameters; incident priorities and performance expectations; shelter-in-place and evacuation guidelines; and local contingency and continuity planning requirements. University departments are responsible for

developing contingency plans and continuity of operations plans for their staff and areas of responsibility. The University conducts numerous emergency response exercises each year, such as table top exercises, field exercises, and tests of the emergency notification systems on campus. These tests are designed to assess and evaluate the emergency plans and capabilities of the institution.

GW police officers and supervisors have received training in Incident Command and Responding to Critical Incidents on Campus. When a serious incident occurs that causes an immediate threat to the campus, the first responders to the scene are usually GWPD, MPD and the DC Fire and Emergency Medical Services (DCFEMS) Department, and they typically respond and work together to manage the incident. Depending on the nature of the incident, other GW departments and other local or federal agencies could also be involved in responding to the incident.

General information about the emergency response and evacuation procedures for GW are publicized each year as part of the institution's Clery Act compliance efforts, and that information is available on the GWPDP website. Detailed information and updates to the GW Incident Manual and departmental Contingency and Continuity Plans are available on the Campus Advisories website at <http://www.CampusAdvisories.gwu.edu>.

### **Notification to the GW Community about an Immediate Threat**

The Office of Public Safety and Emergency Management (OPSEM) and the External Relations Office receive information from various offices/departments on campus, such as GWPDP, the Office of Environmental Health and Safety (EHS), and Radiation Safety. If GWPDP or OPSEM confirms that there is an emergency or dangerous situation that poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of some or all members of the GW community, OPSEM and External Relations will collaborate to determine the content of the message and will use some or all of the systems described below to communicate the threat to the GW community or to the appropriate segment of the community, if the threat is limited to a particular building or segment of the population. OPSEM and External Relations will, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the judgment of the first responders (including, but not limited to: GWPDP, MPD, and/or the DC Fire and Emergency Medical

Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

In the event of a serious incident that poses an immediate threat to members of the GW community, the University has various systems in place for communicating information quickly. Some or all of these methods of communication may be activated in the event of an immediate threat to the GW campus community. These methods of communication include network emails, emergency text messages that can be sent to a phone or PDA (individuals can sign up for this service on the Campus Advisories website), and emergency messages that scroll across computer screens when logged into the University system. The University will post updates during a critical incident on the GW Campus Advisories website. Individuals can call GW's recorded information telephone line for updates. GWPDP 4-RIDE vans are equipped with Public Address Systems and these vans can be strategically placed throughout the campus to facilitate communication through the PA System. Members of the larger community who are interested in receiving information about emergencies on campus should sign up for the emergency text message system and should use the Campus Advisories website and the (202) 994-5050 line for obtaining updates in the event of an emergency on campus.

GW community members are encouraged to notify GWPDP of any situation or incident on campus that involves a significant emergency or dangerous situation that may involve an immediate or ongoing threat to the health and safety of students and/or employees on campus. GWPDP has the responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources, to mitigate, investigate, and document any situation that may cause a significant emergency or dangerous situation. In addition, GWPDP has a responsibility to respond to such incidents to determine if the situation does in fact, pose a threat to the community. If so, Federal Law requires that the institution notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

### **Emergency Evacuation Procedures**

An evacuation drill is coordinated by GWPDP each semester for all residential facilities on both the Foggy Bottom and Mount Vernon campuses. A second drill is coordinated each semester for some first year Residence Halls and the more densely populated halls. Thus, the emergency response and evacuation procedures are tested at

least twice each year and, for some of the buildings, four times a year. Students learn the locations of the emergency exits in the buildings and are provided guidance about the direction they should travel when exiting each facility for a short-term building evacuation. GWPD does not tell residents in advance about the designated locations for long-term evacuations because those decisions are affected by time of day, location of the building being evacuated, the availability of the various designated emergency gathering locations on campus, and other factors such as the location and nature of the threat. In both cases, GWPD and Housing Programs staff on the scene will communicate information to students regarding the developing situation or any evacuation status changes.

The purpose of evacuation drills is to prepare building occupants for an organized evacuation in case of a fire or other emergency. At GW, evacuation drills are used as a way to educate and train occupants on fire safety issues specific to their building. During the drill, occupants 'practice' drill procedures and familiarize themselves with the location of exits and the sound of the fire alarm. Palm cards with educational information are distributed to residents re-entering a facility immediately after an evacuation drill. In addition to educating the occupants of each building about the evacuation procedures during the drills, the process also provides the University an opportunity to test the operation of fire alarm system components.

Evacuation drills are monitored by GWPD, EHS, and the Housing Programs Department to evaluate egress and behavioral patterns. Reports are prepared by participating departments that identify deficient equipment so that repairs can be made immediately. Recommendations for improvements are also submitted to the appropriate departments/offices for consideration.

Students receive information about evacuation and shelter-in-place procedures during their first floor meetings and during other educational sessions that they can participate in throughout the year. The House Staff members are trained in these procedures as well and act as an on-going resource for the students living in residential facilities.

OPSEM conducts numerous announced and unannounced drills and exercises each year and conducts follow-through activities designed for assessment and evaluation of emergency plans and capabilities. GWPD coordinates announced and unannounced evacuation drills each semester, as described above, to test the emergency response and evacuation procedures, and to assess and evaluate the emergency evacuation plans and capabilities. GW will publish a summary of its emergency response and evacuation procedures in conjunction with at least one drill or exercise each calendar year.

## **Shelter-in-Place Procedures – What it Means to “Shelter-in-Place”**

If an incident occurs and the buildings or areas around you become unstable, or if the air outdoors becomes dangerous due to toxic or irritating substances, it is usually safer to stay indoors, because leaving the area may expose you to that danger. Thus, to “shelter-in-place” means to make a shelter of the building that you are in, and with a few adjustments this location can be made even safer and more comfortable until it is safe to go outside.

### **Basic “Shelter-in-Place” Guidance**

If an incident occurs and the building you are in is not damaged, stay inside in an interior room until you are told it is safe to come out. If your building is damaged, take your personal belongings (purse, wallet, GWorld card, etc.) and follow the evacuation procedures for your building (close your door, proceed to the nearest exit, and use the stairs instead of the elevators). Once you have evacuated, seek shelter at the nearest University building quickly. If police or fire department personnel are on the scene, follow their directions.

### **How You Will Know to “Shelter-in-Place”**

A shelter-in-place notification may come from several sources, including GWPD, Housing Staff members, other University employees, the federal or DC government, MPD, or other authorities utilizing the University’s emergency communications tools.

### **How to “Shelter-in-Place”**

No matter where you are, the basic steps of shelter-in-place will generally remain the same. Should the need ever arise, follow these steps, unless instructed otherwise by local emergency personnel:

1. If you are inside, stay where you are. Collect any emergency shelter-in-place supplies and a telephone to be used in case of emergency. If you are outdoors, proceed into the closest building quickly or follow instructions from emergency personnel on the scene.
2. Locate a room to shelter inside. It should be:
  - An interior room;
  - Above ground level; and

-Without windows or with the least number of windows. If there is a large group of people inside a particular building, several rooms may be necessary.

3. Shut and lock all windows (tighter seal) and close exterior doors.
4. Turn off air conditioners, heaters, and fans.
5. Close vents to ventilation systems as you are able. (University staff will turn off the ventilation as quickly as possible.)
6. Make a list of the people with you and ask someone (House Staff, faculty, or other staff) to call the list in to GWPD so they know where you are sheltering. If only students are present, one of the students should call in the list.
7. Turn on a radio or TV and listen for further instructions.
8. Make yourself comfortable.

#### **Annual Fire Safety Report**

If a fire occurs in a GW building, community members should immediately notify GWPD at (202) 994-6111. GWPD will initiate a response, as the department has a direct dial phone line to the DC Unified Communications Center and can summon the fire department quickly through this communication link. If a member of the GW community finds evidence of a fire that has been extinguished, and the person is not sure whether GWPD has already responded, the community member should immediately notify GWPD to investigate and document the incident.

The fire alarms alert community members of potential hazards, and community members are required to heed their warning and evacuate buildings immediately upon hearing a fire alarm in a facility. Use the nearest stairwell and/or exit to leave the building immediately. Community members should familiarize themselves with the exits in each building. The Fire Marshall can levy fines and penalties to individuals who fail to evacuate a building promptly – but a more important reason for evacuating is for safety reasons!

When a fire alarm is activated, the elevators in most buildings will stop automatically. Occupants should use the stairs to evacuate the building. If you are caught in the elevator, push the emergency phone button. The emergency phones in elevators on campus typically ring to the GWPD dispatcher or to a security desk.

After a false alarm in a residential facility, an email message is distributed to building residents, typically the next business day, informing them of the cause of the activation and the reason for the evacuation. The purpose of providing follow-up information is

to use those instances as a teaching moment to point out the reason for the alarm activation, the evacuation routes, and instructions and guidelines for evacuations.

GWPD publishes this fire safety report as part of its annual Clery Act Compliance document, via this brochure, which contains information with respect to the fire safety practices and standards for GW. This report includes statistics concerning the number of fires, the cause of each fire, the number of injuries and deaths related to a fire, and the value of the property damage caused by a fire (see charts on pages 42-45 for more information). The compliance document is available for review 24-hours a day on the GWPD website at <http://gwired.gwu.edu/upd/compliance>.

#### **Fire Protection Equipment/Systems**

A majority of University buildings are equipped with automatic fire detection and alarm systems that are constantly monitored by staff at GWPD. Refer to pages 46-49 to review the Fire Safety Amenities in the GW Residential Facilities Chart for information about fire detection, notification, and suppression systems in each residential facility.

#### **Health and Safety Inspections**

The Office of Environmental Health & Safety performs Residence Hall Health and Safety (H&S) Inspections five times a year, twice in the Fall and in the Spring and once in the Summer. Inspections will be announced only during the first round of the fall semester. All other inspections are unannounced. The H&S inspections are primarily designed to find and eliminate safety violations. Students are required to read and comply with the Residential Community Conduct Guidelines (RCCGs), which include the H&S inspections and all other rules and regulations for residential buildings. The inspections include, but are not limited to, a visual examination of electrical cords, sprinkler heads, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers and other life safety systems.

In addition, each room will be examined for the presence of prohibited items (e.g., sources of open flames, such as candles; non-surge protected extension cords; halogen lamps; portable cooking appliances in non-kitchen areas; etc.) or prohibited activity (e.g., smoking in the room; tampering with life safety equipment; possession of pets; etc.). This inspection will also include a general assessment of food and waste storage and cleanliness of the room. Prohibited items will be immediately disabled with a locking device or confiscated and donated/discarded if found, without reimbursement.

### Fire Safety Tips

Buildings are equipped with a variety of features that are designed to detect, stop and/or suppress the spread of a fire.

- A door can be the first line of defense against the spread of smoke or fire from one area to another. Some doors, such as fire doors in corridors or stairwells of residence halls, are designed to stand up to fire longer than those of an individual room. It is important that these doors are CLOSED for them to work. Additionally, if a door has a device that automatically closes the door, it should NOT be propped open.
- Sprinklers are 98% effective in preventing the spread of fire when operating properly. DO NOT obstruct the sprinkler heads with materials like clothing hanging from the piping.
- Smoke detectors cannot do their job if they are disabled or covered by the occupant, which is a violation of University Policy.
- Almost  $\frac{3}{4}$  of all fires that are caused by smoking material are the result of a cigarette being abandoned or disposed of carelessly. Smoking is NOT PERMITTED in any GW building.

A daily fire log is available for review 24-hours a day on the GWPD website at <http://gwired.gwu.edu/upd> or at GWPD at Woodhull House, in room 102, from 8 a.m.–5 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. The information in the fire log typically includes information about fires that occur in residential facilities, including the nature, date, time, and general location.

### Education of Members of the University Community

Campus security and fire safety procedures are discussed during new student orientation (Colonial Inauguration). The GW Police Department (GWPD), the Office of Environmental Health and Safety (EHS), the Office of Public Safety and Emergency Management (OPSEM), and the Dean of Students Office, including Housing Programs Department officials, participate in forums, town hall meetings, and programs in residence halls to address students and to explain University security, public safety, and fire safety measures and procedures at GW. Members of GWPD conduct crime prevention and general security and safety awareness presentations when requested by various community groups, including students and employees of the University. During these presentations, the following information is typically provided: crime prevention tips; statistics on crime at GW; fire safety information; information regarding campus security procedures and practices, including

encouraging participants to be responsible for their own security/safety and for the security/safety for others on campus. In addition, GWPD organizes and sets up crime prevention and education display tables which are staffed by an officer(s) at various locations throughout the year. This activity provides an opportunity for GWPD staff to hand out safety-related information, as well as to answer individual questions. New employee orientation includes the distribution of crime prevention and fire safety materials to all new employees. During the 2008-2009 academic year, GWPD conducted 83 events and presentations and set up and staffed 27 crime prevention display tables. The Dean of Students Office conducted 303 programs including information regarding alcohol education, fire safety, personal safety, and crime prevention for the GW community. OPSEM and EHS participated in and/or conducted 40 educational programs for students and employees. The programs conducted by all of these offices included general crime prevention and security awareness programs, such as safety education forums, programs and discussions about topics such as alcohol abuse, domestic violence, self defense, fire safety, emergency response and evacuation procedures, sexual assault prevention, and theft prevention.

On the Foggy Bottom Campus, GWPD provides an escort service using vans which are available from 7 p.m. to 5:30 a.m., seven days a week to students, staff, faculty, and visitors who request it by calling (202) 994-RIDE (7433). Escorts are provided to and from campus within a three-block radius of the campus boundary. In addition to the Escort Service, GWPD provides an on-campus shuttle service, the Colonial Express, with various stops throughout the GW campus community. The Colonial Express operates from 7 p.m. to 3 a.m. daily, throughout the academic year.

On the Mount Vernon Campus, GWPD provides walking escorts around the campus from dusk to dawn for students, faculty, and visitors who request it by calling (202) 242-6110.

GWPD also offers a self-defense program to all members of the GW community. The Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) program teaches basic self-defense skills and techniques capitalizing on women's lower center of gravity and greater lower body strength. The program assists women in gaining confidence in their own abilities, as well as making them more aware of their surroundings.

GWPD promotes the Operation Identification program, engraving serial numbers or owner's recognized numbers (e.g. driver's license number) on items of value, and makes engravers available upon request free of charge by GWPD.

GWPD utilizes a campus-wide state-of-the-art computerized monitoring system to monitor a comprehensive network of intrusion, panic, and fire alarm systems.

## Victim Assistance Services

If a GW community member becomes the victim of a crime, the GWPD Coordinator of Victim Services & Educational Initiatives offers direct services, assistance and referrals. The Coordinator provides assistance to victims/survivors of a crime by assisting them in obtaining the services they need to work through and better understand their options. The GWPD Coordinator works closely with other University offices and DC agencies to assist the victim in receiving effective, comprehensive services and compassionate responses.

In addition, GWPD officers offer information and guidance to victims when they file a GWPD report and there is a significant amount of victim services information available on the GWPD website.

## Responsibilities of the University Community

Members of the University community must assume responsibility for their own personal safety and the security of their personal property. The following precautions provide guidance.

1. Report all suspicious activity to GWPD immediately.
2. Never take personal safety for granted.
3. Try to avoid walking alone at night. Use the GWPD escort service.
4. Limit your alcohol consumption, and leave social functions that get too loud, too crowded, or that have too many people drinking excessively. Remember to call GWPD or MPD for help at the first sign of trouble.
5. Carry only small amounts of cash.
6. Never leave valuables (wallets, purses, books, calculators, etc.) unattended.
7. Carry your keys at all times and do not lend them to anyone.
8. Lock up bicycles and motorcycles. Lock car doors and close windows when leaving your car.
9. Always lock the door to your residence hall room, whether or not you are there. Be certain that your door is locked when you go to sleep, and keep windows closed and locked when you are not at home.
10. Do not leave valuables in your car, especially if they can be easily noticed.

11. Engrave serial numbers or owner's recognized numbers, such as a driver's license number, on items of value.
12. Inventory your personal property and insure it appropriately with personal insurance coverage.

## Notification of Missing Students

If a member of the University community has reason to believe that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing, he or she should **immediately** notify GWPD at (202) 994-6111. GWPD will generate a missing person report and initiate an investigation.

After investigating the missing person report, should GWPD determine that the student is missing and has been missing for more than 24-hours, GW will notify MPD and the student's emergency contact no later than 24-hours after the student is determined to be missing. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated individual, GW will notify the student's parent or legal guardian immediately after GWPD has determined that the student has been missing for more than 24-hours.

In addition to registering an emergency contact, students residing in on-campus housing have the option to identify, confidentially, an individual to be contacted by GW in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24-hours. If a student has identified such an individual, GW will notify that individual no later than 24-hours after the student is determined to be missing. A student who wishes to identify a confidential contact can do so through the GW Housing website. A student's confidential contact information will be accessible only by authorized campus officials and law enforcement as appropriate.

## Alcohol and Drug Policies

GWPD is committed to promoting the health and safety of its campus community through a program of alcohol education and the implementation of relevant policies. The University enforces compliance with local DC alcoholic beverage laws on campus and at University sponsored activities. The University affirms its adherence to the following principles:

- The misuse and/or abuse of alcoholic beverages and related behavior, such as disorderly conduct, illness due to excessive consumption of alcohol, and destruction of property, pose a danger to individual members of the University community and to the community at large.

- The promotion of alcoholic beverage consumption as the primary focus of on- and off-campus activities is inappropriate because it invites members of the University community to violate University regulations and DC law.
- Consumption of alcoholic beverages should only be by persons of legal age and by personal choice.
- Those who choose to consume alcoholic beverages should do so responsibly and in moderation.
- Consumption of alcoholic beverages should not be the main focus of an event or the only means of refreshment at an event.
- The responsibility for proper consumption of alcoholic beverages and for compliance with DC laws rests with each individual member of the University community.
- The University will contact by phone and/or letter parents of underage students who violate the Alcohol Policy and parents of any students who violate the Drug Policy.

The entire text of the *Alcoholic Beverage Consumption and Distribution Policy and Procedures*, as well as the University's penalties for possession or distribution of controlled substances by students on University premises or at institutionally-sponsored activities off-campus, are contained online at <http://policy.gwu.edu>. *The Code of Student Conduct* also specifies the prohibitions and the penalties for violations of these prohibitions and is part of the *Guide to Student Rights and Responsibilities*, which is published under separate cover and is available through GW Housing Programs at Foggy Bottom and at the Mount Vernon Office of Campus Life. In addition, GW is in compliance with the federal Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989. Each year GW renews its commitment to the letter and spirit of that law with an informational letter to students and employees.

The University does not condone violations of those laws proscribing possession, use, or sale of alcoholic beverages and possession, use, sale, manufacture, or distribution of illegal drugs. Members of the GW community should know that disciplinary action, which may include eviction from the residence halls, revocation of other privileges, or suspension or expulsion from the University, may be taken in order to protect the interests of the University and the rights and safety of others.

Abuse of alcohol and drugs can have a dramatic impact on professional, academic, and family life. The University, therefore, encourages members of the community who may be experiencing difficulty with drugs or alcohol to contact one of the following resources available on-campus:

#### Firearms and Weapons Policies

GW is committed to maintaining a safe and secure environment that supports the academic mission of the University. According to the GW Firearms and Weapons policy, members of the GW community, including faculty, staff, and students, as well as visitors to any of the GW campuses, are prohibited from possessing firearms, explosives, weapons, or any item that may be construed as such, on the premises of the University or in any building under University control, whether or not a federal or state license to possess the same has been issued to the possessor. There are some limited exceptions to this policy; for example certified and licensed law enforcement personnel who are authorized to carry a firearm are permitted to do so on GW property.

All members of the GW community should refer to the Firearms and Weapons policy, which is available on the University's Compliance Office's website at <http://www.gwu.edu/~comply/general/general.html>.

GW does not tolerate the use of firearms or weapons on University owned, controlled, or leased properties. GWPD has and will continue to investigate any threat to the safety of the University in order to protect all members of the University community and their guests.

Additionally, the Firearms and Weapons policy states that anyone found violating the University's policies shall be subject to the disciplinary policies and procedures applicable to students, faculty, or staff and/or criminal prosecution by the appropriate jurisdiction.

Additionally, students should refer to the *Code of Student Conduct* and the *Residential Community Conduct Guidelines* to identify other policies regarding firearms and weapons that may apply to them. Both policies can be found on the Dean of Students' website at <http://gwired.gwu.edu/dos>.

## Emergency Medical Response Procedures

### Foggy Bottom Campus

Students, faculty, staff, and guests should report any emergency medical situations to GWPD immediately at extension 4-6111 or, from outside the University phone system, (202) 994-6111. The GWPD dispatcher will send GWPD officers and (if on duty) on-call members of the Emergency Medical Response Group (EMeRG) to the scene. The Emergency Medical Response Group at GW is a recognized basic life support (BLS), first responder agency within DC. EMeRG's certified personnel operate a BLS ambulance and provide quality emergency medical services in a variety of settings, including campus coverage and special events.

### Mount Vernon Campus

Students, faculty, staff, and guests should report any emergency medical situations to GWPD immediately at extension 2-6111 or, from outside the University phone system, (202) 242-6111. The GWPD dispatcher will send GWPD officers and the DC Fire and Emergency Medical Services personnel.

## RESPONSE TO SEXUAL ASSAULT

### The GW *Code of Student Conduct*

Rape and all forms of sexual assault are violations of GW's *Code of Student Conduct*.

### Male Victims

While most victims of sexual assault are women, some men are also victims. Male victims at GW receive the same services as women. Emotional support, counseling about options, information about resources related to legal issues and medical treatment are available to assist all those recovering from sexual assault.

## Prevention and Education Programs

Programs and information are available through GWPD's Crime Prevention Division of the GW Police Department (2033 G Street, NW), the University Counseling Center (2033 K Street, NW, Suite 330), the Student Health Service (2141 K Street, NW, Suite 501), the Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Education (CADE) (1900 F Street, NW, Suite 117), and the Dean of Students Office (Rice Hall 401).

## Guidelines for Assistance

### 1. IF YOU ARE RAPED OR SEXUALLY ASSAULTED:

- **Get to a safe place as soon as you can.**
- **Try to preserve all physical evidence.** Do not wash, use the toilet, or change clothing if you can avoid it. If you do change clothes, put all clothing you were wearing at the time of the attack in a paper, not plastic, bag.
- **Get medical attention** as soon as possible to make sure you are physically well and to collect important evidence in the event you may later wish to take legal action.
- **Contact GWPD** (follow procedures outlined on page 3 of this brochure).
- **Talk with an advocate or a counselor** who will maintain confidentiality, help explain your options, give you information, and provide emotional support.
- **Contact someone you trust** to be with you and support you.

### Past Abuse

Many individuals experience sexual assault and never tell anyone about it at the time of the incident. If you were victimized weeks or years ago, assistance is still available to you. Talking with someone now may help you cope better with abuse from the past, whether it was rape, child sexual abuse, incest, or sexual harassment.

### 2. MEDICAL TREATMENT

It is important to seek immediate and follow-up medical attention for several reasons: first, to assess and treat any physical injuries you may have sustained; second, to determine the risk of sexually transmitted diseases or pregnancy and take preventive measures; and third, to gather evidence that could aid criminal prosecution. Physical evidence should be collected immediately, ideally within the first 24-hours. It may be collected later than this, but the quality and quantity of the evidence may be diminished.

### **Immediate Emergency Services**

A special exam should be conducted as soon as possible following an assault to ensure your physical well-being and to collect evidence that may be useful in criminal proceedings. The exam can be conducted without the involvement of law enforcement personnel. Even if you have not been physically hurt, this forensic exam is strongly recommended to maintain all your legal options. After the evidence is collected, it can be stored in case you wish to press criminal charges. The exam is performed by an emergency department physician or gynecologist. A nurse is present throughout the procedure, and a support person of your choice can also be present.

Students can receive the exam for free by going to the Washington Hospital Center (202-877-7000) or the Lighthouse Center for Healing (202-742-1720). These locations follow the national standards for victim care, rape exams, and evidence collection procedures.

Note: Ordinarily the police will be contacted by Hospital personnel whenever they provide treatment for injuries resulting from a crime. If you seek treatment at a local hospital and the police are contacted, this does not mean that you have to proceed with criminal charges. In addition, it is recommended that a survivor use a hospital in the county/state where the incident occurred.

### **Transportation**

GWPD provides transportation to the Hospital 24-hours a day and can be reached by calling (202) 994-6110.

### **Non-Emergency Medical Procedures**

Even if you do not have evidence collected at the Hospital, it is still important to get medical attention. An exam in this case should include treatment of any physical problems and various lab tests for sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy. This non-emergency treatment can be arranged with your family doctor or with the Student Health Service (2141 K Street, NW, Suite 501, 202-994-6827).

### **3. THE SEXUAL ASSAULT CRISIS CONSULTATION TEAM**

The Sexual Assault Crisis Consultation (SACC) Team members are trained and prepared to assist the survivor of sexual assault or rape. The team members do not act as counselors, but provide the survivor with information and resources in order to make informed decisions regarding the incident. This information would include: assisting the survivor in identifying his or her medical, legal, counseling, and

academic assistance needs; identifying the appropriate campus and/or community services to provide necessary assistance; providing follow-up with the survivor to determine if the services have been obtained and have met the survivor's needs; and explaining options, such as filing a report with MPD, reviewing disciplinary options available through the University's student judicial system, discussing University housing options, and acting as an educator about rape and sexual assault. The coordinator of the SACC Team can be contacted at (202) 994-6948. To reach an on-call SACC Team member 24-hours a day, call (202) 994-SACC (7222).

### **4. COUNSELING AND EMOTIONAL SUPPORT**

#### **On-Campus**

The University Counseling Center (202-994-5300) is located at 2033 K Street, NW, Suite 330. Counselors can provide confidential support for you during this difficult period. They can inform you of common emotional reactions to this crisis and discuss coping methods that may assist you immediately following the assault and later. Talking about your concerns with a counselor in a safe, supportive environment may help you sort through your feelings and decide what to do. You do not need to disclose your name if you call the Counseling Center for information. Counselors will not reveal your identity to anyone without your permission. Students may be seen on an emergency walk-in basis or by appointment.

Assistance and support for dealing with personal and academic issues is also available from the Dean of Students Office (Rice Hall 401, 202-994-6710) or from your school/college Dean's office.

If a GW community member becomes the victim of a crime, the GWPD Coordinator of Victim Services & Educational Initiatives offers direct services, assistance and referrals. The Coordinator provides assistance to victims/survivors of a sexual assault by assisting them in obtaining the services they need to work through and better understand their options. The GWPD Coordinator of Victim Services works closely with other University offices and city agencies to assist the victim in receiving effective, comprehensive services and compassionate responses.

#### **Off-Campus**

The DC Rape Crisis Center, (202) 232-0789, provides a confidential hotline, (202) 333-RAPE, and advocacy services 24-hours a day, seven days a week, as well as free short-term individual and group counseling.

## 5. REPORTING TO THE GW POLICE DEPARTMENT

This can be done immediately by following the procedures addressed on page 3 of this document. The reasons for reporting to GWPD are: 1) to take action which may prevent further victimization, including issuing a crime alert to warn the campus community of an impending threat to their safety; 2) to apprehend the assailant; 3) to seek justice for the wrong that has been done to you; and 4) to have the incident recorded for purposes of reporting statistics about incidents that occurred on campus.

If you choose to report the incident, a GWPD officer will take a statement from you regarding what happened. The officer will ask you to describe the assailant(s) and may ask questions about the scene of the crime, any witnesses, and what happened before and after the incident. You may have a support person with you during the interview. NOTE: Reporting an incident is a separate step from choosing to prosecute. When you file a report, you are NOT obligated to continue with legal proceedings or University disciplinary action. Remember, you can choose whether or not to participate in proceedings at any point.

## 6. CONFIDENTIAL REPORTING

If you are assaulted and do not want to pursue action within the University system or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report to GWPD. With your permission, a GWPD officer can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the University can keep an accurate record about the number of incidents involving students, employees and visitors; determine where there is a pattern of assaults with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant; and alert the campus community to potential danger.

## 7. UNIVERSITY DISCIPLINARY ACTION

If you have been sexually assaulted by another student or group of students and are considering University action, you are encouraged to discuss the matter with a SACC Team member (see page 58 in this publication) or with a representative from Student Judicial Services (202-994-6757). This will allow you a chance to review the procedures should you decide to file a formal complaint through the University's disciplinary/judicial system. This discussion does not obligate you to pursue official action.

If you decide to take part in the University adjudication process, you should contact Student Judicial Services. Charges may either be filed directly by you or by the University on the basis of your written statement. Such a charge would be handled in accordance with the procedures relating to violations of the University's *Code of Student Conduct* regulations. Individuals could be subject to disciplinary action pending review by the University. Those students found responsible for violating the *Code* in this way could be suspended or expelled. Pursuant to the University's disciplinary procedures, both the accuser and the accused are entitled to have an advisor or support person present during the hearing. Students who allege sexual assault by another student may request a change in their academic and living situations on campus after the alleged incident takes place if such changes are reasonably available. Finally, in accordance with federal regulations, both the accuser and the accused will be informed of the outcome of any campus disciplinary proceeding alleging sexual assault. For more details on these proceedings, consult the *Guide to Student Rights and Responsibilities*.

If you have been sexually assaulted or harassed by a non-student GW employee, this is a violation of the law and University policy. Students should contact a SACC Team member (202-994-SACC, 202-994-7222) or the Sexual Harassment Complaint Center (202-994-6503) to discuss complaints.

## 8. CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION AND CHARGES

If you want to press criminal charges, call the Metropolitan Police Department (or the Loudoun County Sheriff's Department for people at the Virginia Campus). We recommend that you contact a SACC Team member or the GW Police Department before you notify the local police, so they can assist you with the legal processes.

GWPD can notify the appropriate authorities or the complainant may contact them directly. Depending on the timing of your report and preference, it may be possible for you to make a statement in the presence of a GWPD officer and the local police at the same time. Be advised that questioning can be difficult. Remember, you may request that a support person be with you during police interviews (the SACC Team members are available upon request).

If it is possible for the assailant to be apprehended, the suspect will be taken by police before the local Superior Court judge and charged with the appropriate offense(s) at a preliminary arraignment. You do not need to be present for this proceeding. The assailant may be jailed or released on bail depending on the circumstances of the

crime. One of the usual conditions of bail is that the suspect not make any attempt to contact you. If you are contacted by the suspect or feel threatened in any way, you should immediately call GWPD and the local police. Under some circumstances bail may be revoked and additional charges may be filed if necessary.

### Mission Statement

GWPD protects and serves the University and surrounding area by providing professional law enforcement services and actively promoting community involvement through progressive community policing strategies and a commitment to education.

## APPENDIX

### Sex Offenses Definitions

As per the National Incident-Based Reporting System Edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program

#### SEX OFFENSES—FORCIBLE

Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

##### Forcible Rape

The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against the person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is

incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

##### Forcible Sodomy

Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

##### Sexual Assault with an Object

The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

##### Forcible Fondling

The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

#### SEX OFFENSES—NON-FORCIBLE

Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.

##### Incest

Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

##### Statutory Rape

Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

### As Per the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook

**Aggravated Assault:** an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

**Arson:** Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property, etc.

**Burglary:** The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safe-cracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

**Motor Vehicle Theft:** The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned-including joy riding).

**Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter:** The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

**Manslaughter by Negligence:** The killing of another person through gross negligence.

**Robbery:** The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force, violence, and/or causing the victim fear.

**Larceny:** The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

**Vandalism:** To willfully or maliciously destroy, injure, disfigure, or deface any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

**Weapon Law Violations:** The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

**Drug Abuse Violations:** Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (demerol, methadones); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

**Liquor Law Violations:** The violation of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possess-

ing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

## Offense Definitions relating to Hate/Bias Related Crime Statistics as per the UCR Hate Crime Reporting Guidelines

**Simple Assault:** An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious serve or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, sever laceration or loss of consciousness.

**Intimidation:** To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

## Geography definitions from the Clery Act

**On-Campus-Defined as:** (1) Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls; and (2) Any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified in paragraph (1), that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or retail vendor).

**Non-Campus Building Or Property-Defined as:** (1) Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or (2) Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of or in relation to the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

**Public Property-Defined as:** All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.

The GW crime statistics do not include crimes that occur in privately owned homes or businesses within or adjacent to the campus boundaries.

The George Washington University Virginia Campus, the University's research and technology campus, opened in 1991 in the Ashburn community of Loudoun County, just 12 miles west of Tysons Corner. The more than 100+ acre campus offers more than 20 graduate degree and certificate programs in business, education, and engineering and two undergraduate programs in the health sciences. More than 400 faculty and staff work at the Virginia Campus, with about 550 enrolled graduate students.

Four buildings now dot the University Center landscape: Research One, the 77,000 sq. ft. original building, is primarily used for faculty research and classrooms, while Building Two provides 204,000 sq. ft. of classroom and administrative office space. The third building is not used by GW. It houses the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) Academy, 86,000 sq. ft. of state-of-the-art classrooms and laboratories, and an outside simulation court for accident reconstructions. The University purchased a fourth building, Research Two, in 2008 and will use the 78,000 square-foot building for offices and classrooms.

A shuttle van, with stops at Research One and Building Two, transports faculty, staff, and students to and from the Foggy Bottom Campus and from the West Falls Church Metro station on a regular schedule, five days a week.

The GW community has been fortunate in not experiencing serious crimes on the Virginia Campus beyond minor theft, but such incidents could occur. Students, faculty, and staff are advised to adopt measures to best protect themselves and their possessions.

### **Law Enforcement and Security**

The Virginia Campus has an on-site security guard service located in Research One, Research Two, and Building Two. The security guard service acts as a liaison with the GW Police Department (GWPD) (202-994-6110 non-emergency) and the Loudoun County Sheriff's Department (703-777-0445 non-emergency). The security guards do not have arrest authority. The Sheriff's deputies are on duty 24/7 to

enforce state and local statutes. Virginia Campus administration maintains a close working relationship with the appropriate state and local agencies responsible for emergency services and law enforcement.

### **Reporting Procedures**

Members of the Virginia Campus community and their guests should report all public safety incidents (crimes, medical/fire emergencies, safety hazards, suspicious behavior, etc.) to the security officer in the building where the incident occurs.

If the incident is a criminal act in progress or an emergency, call 911 immediately and the Loudoun County Sheriff's Department will respond. Then, please call security to report the incident. If time is not essential, other options for assistance are:

### **Access to Campus Facilities**

The Virginia Campus buildings and grounds are available to students, staff, faculty, and their guests, and to University guests or contractors with reason to enter for activities that are officially approved. Controlled access to buildings is provided by external access card readers. Requests for GWorld access cards are processed by the Building Two Security Guard.

Research One is open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday, with card access at other times. Access to Building Two is via a GWorld card or security guard access only, 24/7. Research Two is being renovated and the hours have not been determined yet.

The Library, located on the first floor of Building Two, is open Monday to Friday, 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Holiday hours or schedule changes will be posted at all buildings in advance. Access cards for Research One and Building Two are available from the Building Two Security Guard.

The Fire Exit doors in Research One and Building Two are alarmed and the appropriate authorities will be notified and will respond accordingly. The card reader doors will alarm if they are held or forced open. The loading dock and other doors are monitored via surveillance cameras that are recorded.

#### **Maintenance of Campus Facilities**

The facilities and landscaping are maintained to minimize conditions that might pose a danger. Access to a ramp is available for entrance into Research One, and Building Two is accessible at the lower level. Malfunctioning lights and other unsafe conditions should be reported to the Operations Office at (703) 726-3510.

#### **Virginia Campus Community Education**

While no crime prevention programs are offered at the Virginia Campus, students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to contact GWPD (202-994-0443) for information about existing programs offered at Foggy Bottom. Crime Alerts are posted in the event of a serious incident that may pose a threat to the campus community, and additional information regarding security regulations is available in the Operations Office, Room B80.

#### **Summary**

The policy of the Virginia Campus is to provide easy access to authorized individuals. That access must be consistent with the safety and the security of authorized individuals' property and that of the University. Questions, suggestions, or problems regarding these matters should be directed to the Operations Manager at the Virginia Campus (703-726-3510). All other policies and procedures for the Virginia Campus that are not specifically addressed in this section of the brochure can be found in the appropriate section in the Foggy Bottom/Mount Vernon section of this document. The information from those sections is not repeated here because it applies to all GW students, including those people taking classes at the Virginia Campus.

#### **Crime Statistics**

The 2006, 2007, and 2008 crime statistics for the Virginia Campus are incorporated into the "statistics" pages of this document (see <http://gwired.gwu.edu/upd>).
